## Gultural Closeup

Betty: We have been traveling quite a lot this past year in our mini van. It made me think of the difference between driving in the United States and driving in Ecuador. One thing is similar— in both countries you drive on the right side of the road. Other than that, it's basically two different activities. In Ecuador speed limits are posted, but not enforced. (They are ridiculously low, and are viewed by all, including police, as mere mild suggestions!) Also, it's legal to turn left on red. (Boy, do I have to

remember it's illegal in the U.S. I can't say other drivers would be expecting that.)

In Ecuador, you have to drive much more defensively. The other drivers don't follow the rules too strictly and are much more unpredictable. Many people do not use their turn signals for turning or changing lanes. In fact, some people like to let you know that it is safe to pass by turning on their turn signal. Are you confused yet? Worse yet, in most situations drivers completely ignore the lanes marked on the roads, instead fitting in as many cars as will fit, with a lot less space between them than we are used to in the U.S. Rick likes to say that driving in Latin America is like driving in a river: you often just have to go with the flow! Try attempting to figure out where someone is going when he takes up the

two right lanes just to turn left at the last minute. I have wondered if some drivers think unpredictable is better. Also, you have to watch very closely for pedestrians. It's common for them to run across the freeway or jump out of public buses and cross two lanes of traffic without any warning.

Honking your horn is also very common. You can honk to let someone know you are there, or honk if you're annoyed with them, or honk to let them know you are passing them. It's a little confusing since most honks sound similar. Basically, if someone honks at you, just expect something. Who knows what?

We'll have to get back into the swing of driving in Ecuador now that we're heading back. But I have to say there is one big advantage. In Ecuador, the price of gasoline is only about \$2.00 per gallon!
