Are you not of more value than they? ...

"For the Gentiles seek after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them all. "But seek first Matthew 6:25-26, 32-33 the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added to you.

Back Home in Ecuador

Praise God that Mission to the World allowed us to return to Ecuador on schedule on August 31. Our children started classes in the missionary school on September 2, so we all got into our full schedule quickly.

A Sad Note

Three days before our return to Ecuador, we learned that thieves had poisoned our dog and entered our yard here in Quito. They stripped our vehicle of many valuable parts. (It wasn't in an enclosed garage.) It was tough returning to the field without our family pet of 11 years, and without a working vehicle. But God is good. Our number one con-

cern was for our friend who was house-sitting for us. This all happened at night, and she slept through it. The thieves did not try to enter the house, and she was not harmed. Thankfully, we had the vehicle insured. The official from our missionary insurance coop suggested that we use the insurance payment to buy a new vehicle, since most of the parts taken were expensive and difficult to find in Ecuador. So we are car shopping now.

We are also looking for another dog. We have heard that several dogs in our neighborhood have been poisoned before robberies so we are trying to figure out the best way to keep a dog safe, but still use it as a guard dog. Please pray for us about all this.

Gultural Gloseup

Betty: I found myself explaining various times during our summer visit the difference between houses in Ecuador and in the U.S. We rent a nice four bedroom house with a yard here in Quito. The yard is not nearly as big as a yard in the suburban areas of the U.S., but for here, it is a nice size yard. Our house is on the corner and our yard extends around the corner and is about 18 feet across. Houses here

don't have yards that go all the way around the house. Instead, each house usually shares a wall with the houses on either side, leaving no space in between. Many houses have no back yard, and some have no front yard, more like townhouses.

Nearly all the houses in Quito have a wall around the outside of the property, or a fence with bars and spikes, or both. Ours is a wall, and not too tall.

We think the thieves probably jumped the wall to get in, but they would probably have had to open the carport gate from the inside to get the carparts out. Nearly all the houses have bars on the
