## Gultural Gloseup

Rick: Bogotá is a much larger city than Quito, and we find that there are a lot more motorcycle riders here than in Quito. One reason for this is that traffic in Bogotá is often very heavy, and traffic jams often cover much of the city. But motorcycles have the advantage that they can often slip between lanes of traffic and keep moving even when the cars can't! (As a general rule, in Latin America, formally marked lanes are often just taken as suggestions, and the traffic makes as many lanes as will actually fit.) And even when there aren't traffic jams, motorcycles can often weave

around the other cars and move along faster than the rest of the traffic.

This tends to make driving here kind of hairy sometimes. Often I will be about to change lanes, glance back, and see a motorcycle

about to pass me at high speed, right in my blind spot. More than once I have had to jerk the wheel back at the last minute to avoid an accident.

Just as you might expect, there are a lot of serious accidents here involving motorcycles. Thankfully we haven't had one yet, though I have had some close calls, and have gotten chewed out by some motorcyclists I never even saw! So please pray for our safety!
