December Ecuador Trip

Rick: Thanks again for praying for my latest trip to Ecuador with Pastor Javier Muñoz. We were there over two weekends, from November 29 through December 9, and we were able to visit three different Quichua churches.

The first was the tiny congregation in the little village of Pigulca where Segundo has been ministering every Sunday. In my rented car it was a two-hour drive north from Quito, the capital city, but for Segundo it is a three-hour trip on public transportation each direction. And as I said in the last letter, he is doing this without pay, because he knows these people personally and sees the needs of this young congregation. The Lord laid it on my heart to share with the congregation Segundo's financial need. I challenged them to at least pay his transportation costs, and explained to them that God will bless those who give to his work. Though these people are very poor, they took up a collection for his needs, which greatly encouraged us.

On Monday we visited the Sembradores church in south Quito. This is a church we have been involved with for many years. Javier was able to meet them and encourage them with some teaching, and they were very thankful.

The third church we visited was the church in Paltapamba in the province of Bolívar, a 4 hour drive south of Quito through the rugged Andes Mountains. Again Segundo was able to join us. We were able to encourage them, since it turned out to be a week filled with trials. Just a week before we arrived, a member of the church was in a car accident, and part of his tongue was cut off. He was actually the very first believer in the town, and many of the others had come to the Lord through his witness. The three of us went to visit him and pray with him, simply to encourage him and bring him the Lord's comfort. We were thankful that he could still make himself understood even with his injury: we had been concerned that he might not be able to talk at all.

Then the day before we arrived the wife of a church leader from a neighboring town was killed in a traffic accident. This leader was a good friend of Segundo's, and I had also met him some years back. Segundo wanted to pay his respects, so we drove over a very rough road at night to attend the wake.

Then the very evening we arrived, Gerardo, one of the church leaders, who is a policeman, had a wipeout on his motorcycle and had to take to his bed because of serious road rash to both knees. We

also went and visited him and prayed for him.

Ever since 2009 when the Paltapamba church asked to become a Presbyterian church and join with us, I

However, on this visit it became clear that they were ready to do what they could to prepare themselves, including independent study, and with Javier's extensive experience in training pastors in his presbytery and throughout South America, we were able to set up a training plan that looks very promising.

Thank you so much for praying for my health: I was well almost the entire trip, though Javier battled a bad cold most of the trip.

common. Students have their main break from the first of December through the end of January. They also start a new school year when they return in February, making it different from the U.S. system. Schedule A has a short break mid-year in July. Our children are on Schedule B, which has a two-to-three-week Christmas break, and changes school years after a long summer break in June and July, like in the U.S.
