One day I asked Segundo, our Quichua coworker, if he was impressed by the beauty of the mountains when he saw them. He said, "No, the mountains don't affect me at all when

I look at them." At first I was taken aback, but then I remembered that to the Quichuas mountains are not just pretty scenery: traditionally the mountains are an important part of the spirit world, and have their own personalities, almost like gods. It reminded me that in the Old Testament the Canaanites did their wicked pagan worship practices on the high places. So when Segundo said that,

he was saying, "The mountains can't do anything to me because I have God to protect me and empower me!"

Later I began to wonder how he interpreted Psalm 121, which talks about the mountains, and I asked him about it. "I think it means that God created the mountains and all of nature, but that our help comes from him, not from them." Yes! And as I read through the rest of that Psalm, I saw how it would have some additional implications for the Quichuas that it might not have for us. What a mighty God we serve!
