Of course, the ceremony was on-line instead of in person. But she gave a speech anyway! Good job, Anne.

New Help for Hungry Ecuadorians

We are trying to help the Pan de Vida ministry (pandevida.org.ec) with a new initiative to help Ecuadorians through this crisis. They are starting an entrepreneur program to provide seeds or animals and the training for people to grow their own food and maybe have some leftover to sell. We have been checking with the Quichuas to see who can have animals or grow food, or other possible microbusinesses. Meanwhile, Pan de Vida is still trying to provide food until things get off the ground with this new business. We're hoping to meet some new Quichuas through this new initiative.

Ministry struggles

"Thank you, Pastor, thank you for praying for me." I hear this quite a lot from the Quichuas I call regularly to read them a Bible passage and pray with them. But it has certainly been difficult trying to keep discipleships going through the COVID crisis. And it has been nearly impossible to meet new Quichua families. Just one month ago, the government of Quito allowed churches to meet again, but with very strict health and safety rules. We are only allowed 30% capacity and since the rooms we have been using for church services consider full capacity about 30 people, we can't even get two families in. Also, church services are permitted, but no children under 13 years old are allowed to come. That rules out 90% of our Quichua families. Most have young children. Anyway, we are trying to not be discouraged and keep up with our families as best we can.



Cultural Closeup

We have had to do quite a lot of government paperwork this fall, and it is horribly complicated with the COVID crisis. We accomplished getting Anne's cédula (required government ID card) and Ecuadorian passport renewed. Once we got the appointment to go in, it wasn't difficult. But getting the appointments was a challenge. We had to go online and plug in a lot of information, wait for a code, choose an office for the appoint-

ment, then reserve a time to go in. I worked for hours online trying to get an appointment, but every time I

tried, all the appointments were filled. And we could only set up an appointment one week in advance. It helped when someone took pity on us and gave us a hint that, for the ID card, we had to start at 8:45 PM Friday night to get an appointment for the next week. And by 9:30 PM, all the appointments were filled! And for the passport, the time frame was from 8:45-10:00 PM Sunday night. Complicated!

Rick and I both have to renew our Ecuadorian drivers licenses also. That's a whole different dilemma. Rick's expires Nov. 16th, but the first appointment available is the end of January. Mine expires mid-December, and I got in for January, too. The government has said they will allow us to drive on expired licenses only until the end of the year, and then only if we prove we have an appointment to take the test and get the new license!
