Chimborazo Province (the main area for this language group) at the end of May with a couple of the local Biblica (International Bible Society) leaders. I spoke to about 600 people, pastors, leaders, and their families at a conference for Quichua leadership. We were able to sell two boxes of the New Testaments and encourage the leaders to take part in the final check of the translation.

Church planting is tough work right now!

Our little church plant has been really struggling during the pandemic. Ecuador has closed down the country various times since March 2020, and every time we try to get our Sunday meetings started, we are able to meet

Cultural Closeup

Well, Ecuador had a nearly complete shutdown again from April 23 to May 20 due to the rising number of COVID cases. We had a curfew from $\mathcal E$ pm to $\mathcal E$ am every day, Monday through Friday. But the week-

ends were even more difficult. From Friday at $8\,\mathrm{pm}$ until Monday at $5\,\mathrm{am}$, nobody was allowed to leave

the house. All stores, banks, malls, etc. were closed, and basically the only people allowed out were medical personnel, military and police, people with medical emergencies and certain food and pharmacy delivery people. Anyone leaving the house without permission could be fined \$200. And if you decided to invite a bunch of people for the weekend to have a party, you could be fined \$6000 (and we heard that some were). Now, however, the curfew is no longer in effect. But driving regulations still are. We are restricted from driving two days a week, and no one can drive Friday or Saturday after 11 pm until the next morning. I'm not sure how we are going to handle all the freedom when we return to the U.S. this summer!
