- Learning the many, many differences between Ecuadorian culture and U.S. culture (she's still working on that one).

We are so proud of our daughter. Many times she was overwhelmed, but she just kept plugging away

and learning the important things she needed to learn. And over and over again, we saw God's faithfulness. He showed himself faithful, among other things, through good friends, wonderful churches, and good health. God made it clear that He was guiding Anne every step of the way.

In addition to Anne's adjustment, we also took a couple of weeks and sorted through the house my (Betty's) Mom and Dad had lived in for the past 50 years. No meals are provided on campus, nor do they get the "college life" experience that U.S. students do. Many of our Ecuadorian friends can't believe that we just left our daughter at the college!
