## Old Testament Translation Update

The Old Testament translation for the Central Highland Quichua language is continuing strong. We just paid Daniel Sigla for finishing the first draft of Deuteronomy and are about to pay him for Joshua. That is the 8th book he has finished in first draft. I (Rick) have been working on making sure the names for God are consistent throughout the translation, based on the original Hebrew.

### Update on Jared

Thank you for praying for Elsa and her 7-year-old son Jared who has hemophilia. During February, Jared wasn't able to get the blood-clotting medicine he needs on a regular basis because the government hadn't imported any and it just wasn't available. And there are more than 1,000 patients in Ecuador in the same boat. When Jared was really bad the last week in February, Elsa took him to the hospital. At the hospital, another mother had some extra doses, and she loaned them to Elsa until the government could get everyone supplied again. We praised God for His provision! But the government still does not seem to have solved the problem of providing the medicine on a more regular basis, so please keep praying.

## Cultural Closeup

This time I decided to write about something that we have grown accustomed to, but that is very different from life in the U.S. Throughout the day, vehicles drive by playing soundtracks to get everyone's attention. A truck comes by advertising that they buy junk:

"We buy old washers, refrigerators, aluminum, junk, plastic bottles...!"

Or that they sell fruits and vegetables:

"Oranges a dollar a bag, avocados, potatoes, onions, tomatoes, the best prices!"

Also, people walk up and down the street, hollering at the top of their lungs:

"Brooms for sale!"

"Empanadas (turnovers) for your supper!"

We do not have natural gas lines in the city, so trucks come by to change our empty gas tanks with full ones. They used to honk (very loudly) to let everyone know they have gas tanks available. But the neighborhoods complained about the honking, so the city prohibited that and gave them a song soundtrack to play instead so that everyone knows that it is gas. It's a catchy little children's tune, so it gets stuck in your head worse than the honks!

This is our gas tank vender. Angel, the owner, is in the pickup and his assistant carries the full gas tank up 3 flights of stairs into our house to the roof where we have the hot water heater. Then he takes the empty one away with him. These tanks weigh about 70 pounds when full, so those guys stay in shape! It costs us only \$3.50 to refill a tank.
